Why forest kindergartens are so well suited for this.

Speaker: Prof. Dr. Gerald Hüther, Germany

All children are born with two basic needs – the need for closeness, security and connectedness, and the need for autonomy and freedom. However, they can only develop the genetically inherent potential to develop a highly networked brain that is capable of learning throughout their lives if these two basic needs are satisfied. If this is not the case, every child looks for alternative solutions in their own way that are suitable for calming down the incoherent, irritating and enormously energy-consuming conditions that arise from these unfulfilled basic needs.

Forest kindergartens offer the opportunity to prevent such entanglements and, if necessary, to resolve them. With competent guidance from loving carers, children can experience a deep sense of connection and security in nature and at the same time satisfy their second basic need for their own creative freedom better than in any playroom and with all the play equipment advertised as educationally valuable. When playing together carefree in the great outdoors, such children no longer have to suppress their innate joy of discovery and desire to create. This broadens their view, they become more and more open to new learning experiences, acquire a variety of practical life skills, become more resilient, fall ill less often and are also less easily seduced later on.

A loss of indigenous pathways, which once guided our ancestors' relationship with Mother Earth, has had devastating consequences for the well-being of our planet and her people. How did we get to this point in our history and how might we, as practitioners, address the current crises of sustainability, loss of biodiversity, mental health, and wellbeing?

Elizabeth will share the pathway of her ancestors, using the Celtic Wheel of the Year, to encourage you to walk and breathe Earth-Time on a journey towards a re-enchantment with Mother Earth and our more-than-human kin. In times of chaos and uncertainty adopting such a perspective constitutes an act of resistance, countering the more destructive narratives of our time.

Dr. Elizabeth Henderson is an experienced practitioner, manager, lecturer, trainer, researcher, and author with more than 40 years of experience in education. Her work currently focuses on sustainability, indigenous pathways, and the Celtic Wheel of the Year. She is the founder of several innovative projects in Scotland including "Nature Nurture", which she created for 2–3-year-old children from challenging backgrounds. She has also contributed to Scottish Government documents on outdoor learning and play.

The importance of being outdoors and how to plan it. Finnish examples of outdoor early childhood education

Speaker: Ulla Myllyniemi, Finland

This presentation discusses the benefits and necessity of being outdoors, the importance of nature connectedness, and offers a practical model and tool on how to design pedagogical nature education. It includes a brief overview of Finnish nature kindergartens and their practices.

Ulla Myllyniemi is an environmental and sustainability education trainer at Sykli Environmental College as well as an outdoor education expert, classroom teacher, special needs teacher and nature and wilderness guide. She has degrees in education, special education and environmental education as well as a qualification as a nature and wilderness guide. She is the author and editor of several books on outdoor education and has participated in numerous national and international projects, seminars and workshops on environmental education and outdoor learning. She is also a founding member of the Finnish Association for Outdoor Education and is involved in various networks and organisations. She has been honoured with the Vihti INNO Award for her contributions to outdoor education.

Forest kindergarten in uncertain times Finding an anchor in a chaotic reality

Speaker: Ron Meltzer, Israel

For seven years, Ron led "Keshet Kindergarten" in Mitzpe Ramon – the first public forest kindergarten in Israel. Under his leadership, the kindergarten became a recognized experimental model by the Ministry of Education and later served as one of the reference models for Israel's "Kindergarten of the Future" initiative.

Today, Ron lectures and trains educators across Israel on topics such as forest education, educational innovation, the impact of nature on the well-being of children and adults, and the development of pedagogical frameworks for outdoor learning. He mentors educators, develops forest pedagogy, and leads the training center for the Ganey Ya'ar network, which currently supports over 50 educational institutions across 12 municipalities.

Ron Meltzer is the founder of the forest education approach in Israel and the initiator of "Ganey Ya'ar" ("Forest Kindergartens"), an organization dedicated to integrating nature-based education into the public education system. He holds a B.Ed. in Education from Kaye Academic College and is a graduate of the Introductory Year in Anthroposophical Education, the Guardians of the Forest program, and studies in dialogical education with educational philosopher Dr. Danny Lasri. Ron is also a lecturer in the M.A. program in Environmental Education at Kibbutzim College, a recipient of the 2016 Recanati Award for Educational Entrepreneurship, and the author of the book Making the World Your Home, which weaves personal narrative with educational philosophy and practice.

Impoverishment of relationships, disembodiment and de-objectification of childhood? Effects of digital products on children and parents

Speaker: Prof. Dr. Joachim Bauer, Germany

From the first day of life, children need the resonance of their environment for their healthy development – see Joachim Bauer: 'Wie wir werden wer wir sind', Heyne Verlag. Children develop a healthy 'self' not only by being sufficiently mirrored by their parents and pedagogical companions in response to their expressions of life.

Equally important are resonance experiences in nature – see Joachim Bauer: 'Fühlen was die Welt fühlt', Heyne Verlag. Children can only experience who they are and how the world works through physical encounters with their peers and with the diverse offerings of the natural environment. Children get their first idea of what gravity is by falling and getting up again; what speed is by running; what resistance is by testing themselves against their peers and testing their strength in nature; what statics is by building something up with things and letting it collapse again. The world of numbers is best understood by children through the little fingers of their hands.

Univ-Professor Dr. med. Joachim Bauer is a neuroscientist, doctor, psychiatrist and non-fiction author. In his generally understandable books, Bauer explains the significance of the findings of modern neuroscience for education, family life, co-operation in the workplace and social coexistence. Prof Bauer worked successfully at Freiburg University Hospital for many years. He now lives, teaches and works in Berlin.

How trees became the third educator Nature education in Turkey

Speaker: Iskender Yildirim, Türkei

When I quit my secure job in Germany ten years ago, I never thought that a question about a sunny day would change my professional life. My first workshop in an Istanbul kindergarten revealed a terrifying reality: children who were not allowed outside all day despite the sun and outdoor facilities. The reason? Parents didn't want them to. An isolated case? No – everyday life. Yet today – a decade later – the same parents are asking: "Is my child going into the forest today?" What happened in Turkey? Why are children now playing in puddles and building huts out of branches? The term 'nature education' has found a permanent place in the language used by daycare centre managers – but what does implementation really look like?

In my presentation, I will get to the bottom of these questions – with many insights from practice. I will also take a look at Germany: Why do so few children with a Turkish migration background actually attend forest and nature kindergartens in Germany? What role does the educational understanding of their parents' and grandparents' country of origin play? What images of learning, nature and 'good education' are unconsciously passed on?





Green stuff – knowledge that lasts How to turn children into wild plant detectives – with a nose for the green world

In this workshop, I show how children can discover edible wild plants in a playful and safe way – without electricity, with few materials and right on your own doorstep.

I accompany the course and show my tried-and-tested methods that are fun for children and at the same time impart valuable knowledge: We turn children into little wild plant detectives who can track down, identify and taste nettles, goutweed and the like with all their senses. You will learn creative games, songs, child-friendly mnemonics and simple collection ideas with which you can safely integrate wild plants into your everyday educational programme – even if you are not (yet) a plant specialist yourself. At the end, you will not only take away a worksheet, but also lots of ideas for your groups – and the certainty of how much enthusiasm can be found in a dandelion. A green learning adventure for educational professionals with a passion for pure nature!

Christine Rauch also known by her alter ego Survival Siglinde, is one of the leading experts on edible wild plants and the bestselling author of the book "Wilde Pflanzen essen mit Survival Siglinde" (Eating Wild Plants with Survival Siglinde). As an experienced consultant on self-sufficiency with edible wild plants and an enthusiastic infotainer with over 73,000 followers on Instagram, she imparts knowledge about the diverse and nutrient-rich plants that we encounter in nature in a humorous and practical way.

She has introduced over 2000 children to wild plants in her courses in a wide variety of formats, including at the 2021 Federal Garden Show. As a speaker and workshop leader, she is active throughout Germany and has made it her mission to bring the benefits and fascination of the wild plant world closer to a broad audience.

Fine smoked products from the forest and meadows

Speaker: Friederike Grabsch

Smoking has been with us humans since the beginning. Incredible riches were spent on smoked goods. Worldwide trade routes were built to transport them. At almost all times, smoking was an everyday ceremony, as commonplace as brushing your teeth. It is only in the last few hundred years that smoking has fallen into disuse in our culture.

We want to find out what the things that surround us in the woods and meadows actually smell like, what possibilities there are for smoking and we want to try out different ways of preparing and recipes for fine incense. Incense burning can also enrich everyday life for our children in the forest kindergarten and help them to explore and experience nature on another sensory level... and thus get closer to this everyday practice that has accompanied us humans for so long.

Friederike Grabsch felt drawn to the outdoors to learn, relax and experience adventure while studying to become a primary school teacher and later a special needs teacher. It is therefore not surprising that she trained as an adventure educator at the same time and accompanied young adults with disabilities on trips throughout Europe as a part-time job. After graduating, she soon switched from school to the forest: As an educator at the Klein Hundorf forest kindergarten, she found a place where she could combine her educational work with her love of nature. This was followed by further training as a nature and environmental educator (Naturschule InNatura) and as a course leader for forest bathing (Akademie Waldbaden). Her educational work and her everyday life are characterised by her enthusiasm for wild herbs, nature crafts and treasure hunts – as well as her artistic activities in the field of glass recycling and glass cutting.



Forest after-school club Free-Range Kids, very practical

Speaker: Karen Brummer, Pit Golle

Forest after-school clubs for schoolchildren are rare. What makes a forest after-school club special? Pit Golle and Karen Brummer provide practical answers to this question, and not just as founders of the Freie Waldhort in Ebersberg. They look at both the content and methods of working with primary school children.

Karen and Pit talk about everyday life outdoors with schoolchildren, about special occasions such as International Mud Day, about spending the night in the wilderness, and they introduce participants to spruce tip syrup and nettle crisps. They show schoolchildren how to suddenly make salad tasty by flavouring it with balsam seeds that they have collected themselves.

From their trip to the international conference of the Children and Nature Network, Karen and Pit are bringing back an old Native American game, which they made together with the other participants at the conference. They invite the participants to take part in a philosophical nature discussion, which they have tried out many times with school and pre-school children. Finally, they encourage the implementation of complaint management for children. Their work, which began more than 10 years ago, has since found its way into pedagogical research.

Pit Golle is a founding member of the non-profit association, served for many years as its treasurer, and works pedagogically in the forest after-school club. As a trained economist and social scientist specializing in economic psychology and macroeconomics, he entered entirely new professional territory when he transitioned into partial retirement. He supported Karen Brummer during the founding phase.

Karen Brummer looks back on 30 years of working with school children as an educator and has been leading the Freier Waldhort Ebersberg since 2012. After the founding of the organization, she introduced Pit to the practical work with school children and qualified him as an additional support staff member.

Experience nature, develop resilience A motopedagogical workshop

Speaker: Annette Ebsen, Matthias Pose

Nature as a space for experience and movement not only offers children space to develop, but also important impulses for the development of psychological resistance – resilience. In this motopedagogical workshop, we discover how targeted movement units in and with nature can strengthen protective factors and holistically promote educational processes.

The focus is on experience: Through numerous practical exercises, the 'play space of nature' can be experienced as a powerful space for learning and development. Participants receive a repertoire of immediately realisable ideas, games and methods for their own educational practice. The focus is on the connection between experiencing nature, movement and the development of key resilience factors such as self-efficacy, problem-solving skills, relationship building and emotional regulation.

Anette Ebsen, a primary and secondary school teacher as well as a state-certified motopedagogue, and Matthias Pose, a state-certified early childhood educator and motopedagogue, have been working together as a motopedagogical team in the Schleswig-Flensburg district for over 17 years.

Matthias Pose founded JuKidZ am Beektal in 2008, a nature-oriented center for children's and youth work in the Amt Eggebek region, where digital media are deliberately avoided. The focus here is on direct experiences in nature, relationship-building, and shared movement.

Together, they have developed Kon-takt-Training.de – a self-confidence and resilience training programme for children and young people that sees movement as a central means of personal development. Since 2014, Anette Ebsen and Matthias Pose have jointly managed the family centre in Eggebek am Beektal, which is considered the heart of regional education and prevention work.

The term Coyote Teaching is based on the teaching methods of indigenous peoples in North America in nature. Coyote Teaching essentially consists of inspiration, stories that take you on a journey, the courage to not know, your own experience and the joy of inquisitive research and experimentation. Theoretical and direct knowledge transfer, as well as ready-made solutions, are not in the foreground here. Nature mentoring describes a benevolent and loving approach to accompanying people on their nature and life journey. There are all kinds of bird tracks in the forest, but none fascinate us as much as feathers. They are colourful, soft, light and stable and also touch our hearts. You will learn ancient natural knowledge about feathers. We will experiment and research, look at the three main types of feathers and create an exciting and magical feather puzzle.

Ralph Müller, raised in Düsseldorf, now lives in his chosen home of Sonthofen in beautiful Allgäu. For nearly 30 years, he has led his nature and wilderness school, sharing his nature knowledge with humor in seminars and trainings. He also offers multi-week canoe wilderness tours in the Masurian Lakes and Canada. He is the author of the books "Die geheime Sprache der Vögel" (The Secret Language of Birds) and "Raus in die Wildnis" (Out into the Wilderness).

When the forest becomes a classroom Living and learning in the forest class 123 at Conrad Primary School

Speaker: Birgit Eiselt, Maxi Rothbart

Workshop in german, translator on site

Much has been reported in recent years about the importance of experiencing nature for early childhood development, particularly in the areas of health, motor skills, creativity and self-image. For example, the connection between movement and language development already plays an important role in primary school. However, these opportunities for experience often end when children enter primary school. Everyday life is then characterised by tight time and space constraints, expectations of conformity, risk avoidance, lack of movement, limited self-determination and a lack of development opportunities.

With the aim of changing this, Waldklasse 123 was founded in 2016 at the state-run Conrad School in Berlin-Wannsee. The inter-year forest class (JüL 123) works inclusively in a voluntary all-day programme (7:30-16:00), and the children spend most of the school day in the forest or in other natural learning spaces. Our presentation presents the daily and weekly structure and uses examples to illustrate the practical coverage of the various educational areas.

Birgit Eiselt is a primary school teacher who holds a Montessori diploma and has led playgroups in kindergartens. Since 2009, she has worked as a class teacher at Conrad School in Berlin-Wannsee, where she maintains cooperation with local daycares, including two forest kindergartens. In 2016, she co-founded the inclusive forest class (grades 1–3).

Maxi Rothbart earned her biology diploma in 2006 and worked in research. In 2017, she began training as a nature educator (Naturschule Deutschland) and, simultaneously, as an early childhood educator (Pestalozzi-Fröbel-Haus Berlin), focusing on (syn-) aesthetic education, forest pedagogy, and diversity. Since 2018, she has supported the Forest Class 123 as an intern and has been a permanent team member since 2020. She has also since earned her Montessori diploma.

Recognize and solve (legal) problems in daycare centers

Speaker: Bartosz Dzionsko

Workshop in german, translator on site Saturday only

Every daycare centre involves legal risks. This workshop shows where these risks lie, how to avoid or at least reduce them, and how to deal with problems correctly. Participants are encouraged to share their own past or current challenges. General meetings in particular often harbour mistakes that can have major consequences. Unintended liability claims should also be avoided, as those responsible may be personally liable with their private assets.

Lawyer and certified tax law specialist Bartosz Dzionsko (Dreyenberg Law Firm) raises awareness of typical risks in daycares, presents everyday areas of risk, and explains what to watch out for in certain areas to better assess legal challenges and act with more confidence. Participants can exchange experiences with him throughout.

Topics include how to respond to allegations of child endangerment, how to reduce criminal liability risks, and how to minimise liability risks, especially for board members. The possible far-reaching consequences of problems at general meetings will be addressed, as well as important deadlines in association, tax, and administrative law. The workshop also explains what a company daycare centre is and how a forest kindergarten can unintentionally become one. Other everyday legal challenges in daycare operations will also be discussed.

Bartosz Dzionsko is a founding partner of DREYENBERG, a nationally active, multiple award-winning law firm. He specialises in non-profit law, particularly in the establishment and tax advice of non-profit limited companies (gGmbHs), associations, and foundations. As a certified tax law specialist, he provides comprehensive advice to non-profit organisations on tax and legal matters, including customs and white-collar criminal law. He also supports organisations with compliance issues, internal investigations, and the enforcement of liability claims. Discover new worlds through singing – recharge your batteries with lightness and joy – feel gratitude for life




